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BARRIERS TO PWDS FOR INCLUSION


There exists a wide disparity at three Principal levels with respect to differently abled (Divyangjan) persons. These are accessibility, affordability and entitlement claim in terms of education, public resources and employment opportunities. Besides, cardinal feature of safe & dignified quality of life remains non-negotiable and under lying like public good.

People with disabilities (PwDs) have the same rights as everyone else in the community. Most people with disabilities have limited access to education and skill trainings due to a combination of factors including the lack of a coherent national policy and technical support system to address their particular learning/education/empowerment needs. Particular needs issues affecting PwDs generally are ignored in the national development agenda and their well being often treated as a matter of welfare rather than as fundamental human rights on the other hand PwDs lack the means to advocate for and claim their rights as citizens. As such a little formal support has been made to effectively address their basic needs with regard to access to basic social services including education, skill training and sustainable livelihood opportunities. In light of this and recognizing that, education is fundamental human rights for all as well as a key instrument of development and social empowerment. In order to address the challenges faced by PwDs in particular to enable and include them in national development. There is the need to empower them by removing institutional, attitudinal, social and information barriers for their development as well as by creating an environment supportive of inclusive social progress.

In the context of barriers to PwDs for inclusion, organization systematically continuing training programmes and action oriented projects for individual autonomy and independent livelihood of the PwDs in the community. Organization with the assistance of Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Govt. of India, and SSEPD Dept. , Govt. of Odisha Continuing different social mobilization, Capacity building training activities including action oriented activities in institutional and non-institutional setup for the comprehensive rehabilitation of all categories of PwDs under RPwD Act. 2016.

Let us come together to a single platform and discuss how to remove the obstacles & barriers and make a new beginning to join hands together for ensuring the individual autonomy of the persons with disabilities par with the normal persons for their inclusion in the society.

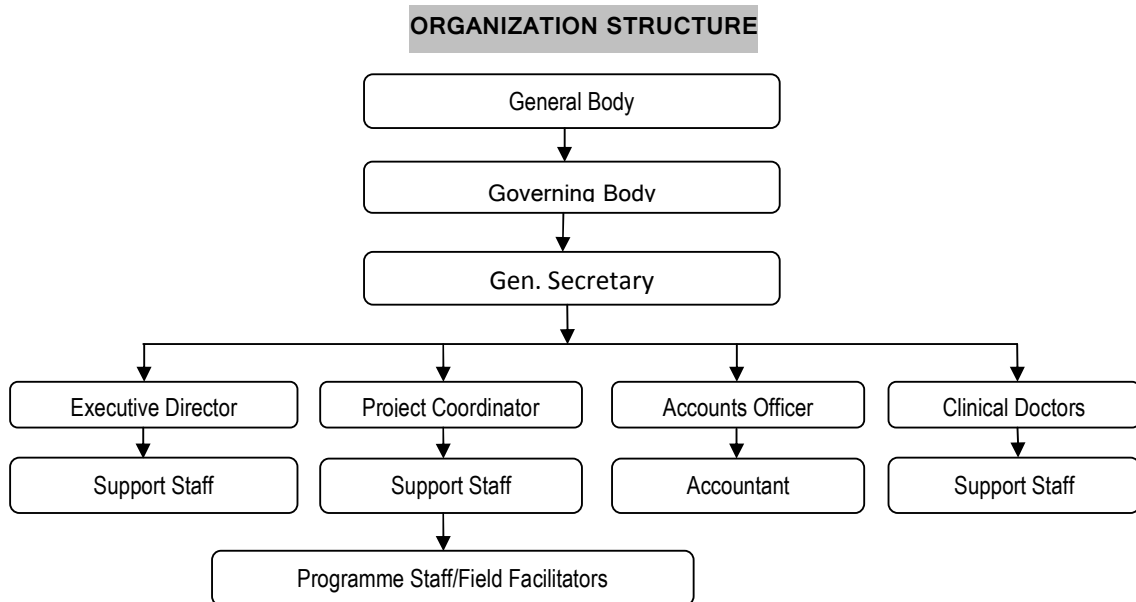

The efforts of professionals took a concrete shape in the late research (CRSR)

which was registered as a voluntary organization under the relevant Act. To achieve the long term objectives, organization also be registered under various other Acts at status.

VISION STATEMENT

CRSR, the voluntary development organization engaged in socio-development alternatives, aims to promote a society free from exploitation, injustice and to make community self reliant based on model principles of an egalitarian society. Organization rejuvenates the team spirit of marginalized class of people and also the distressed differently abled segment of population which strengthen the self help movement for their participation in developmental programmes. The self help movement also enable them to envisage their socio-economic status, self worth and dignity like have class people in the community. 5. To adopt & implement Inclusive Education for Children with disabilities at secondary level for the complete educational rehabilitation of children with special needs.
6. To rehabilitate and trained up differently abled individuals, as well as to find ways to integrate them in to their communities.
7. To conduct different types of human resource development-training programmes such are teachers training programme on special education and other professional/ Personnel's courses for rehabilitation PwDs and community as a whole.
8. To create awareness among the citizens on health care, reproductive child health, family planning, Sanitation and provide health care & education and rehabilitation services on the issues of HIV, TB, Leprosy, Cancer and Hepatitis etc.

MAJOR ACTIVITIES
(2017-18)

1. Assistance to Disabled Persons for Purchase/fitting of aids/appliances (ADIP).

After enactment of RPwDs Act, 2016 Govt. shall take effective measures to ensure personal mobility with the greatest possible independence for the persons with disabilities. Personal mobility enhances choice and physical mobility to assume power over their lives. Therefore aids/appliances and assistive technologies need to be appropriate and affordable. Primary rehabilitation activates their static position and strengthens their confidence & positive feelings into reality. Organization has been continuing the schematic programme "ADIP" in collaboration with Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Govt. of India in 09 (Nine) districts i.e. Bhadrak, Balasore, Keonjhar, Jajpur, Mayurbhanj, Dhenkanal, Cuttack, Kendrapara and Nayagarh of the state, Odisha. In liaisoning with district administration and Panchayats samitee, Organization arranged the identification and distribution

of aids/appliances camp for PwDs and distributed/fitment aids/appliances through camp approach at block level points. The professionals of the organization adopting the latest technology for fabrication/fitment prosthetic & orthotic appliances and distributed mobility aids like Tricycle, Wheel chair, Crutches and Elbow crutches, Walking sticks, Walkers etc. Our audiologist cum speech therapist after proper audiometric test fitted hearing aids to the identified PwD beneficiaries.

CRSR has been distributed/fitment 502 Nos. of assistive devices to 334 nos. of different categories of PwDs during the year 2017-18.

2. Identification/ Assessment Camps for Persons with Disabilities.

The identification & assessment of PwDs traced out the magnitude problems of deformities for fitment of proper aids/appliances. Organization has been continuing the identification & assessment camp for persons with disabilities with the co-operation of local level NGOs, Panchayat sammittees and District administration in 09 (nine) districts of Odisha i.e. Bhadrak, Balasore, Cuttack, Dhenkanal, Jajpur,



Nayagarh by a team of rehabilitation professionals. During the year 2017-18, 1486 nos. of persons with disabilities are identified for distribute and fitment of aids & appliances in the above nine districts of Odisha.

3. Clinical Services:

The Organization has been providing different clinical services such as X-ray, pathology, ECG etc. since last 18 years and during the current year, 8356 nos. of beneficiaries are benefited through free of cost/ nominal cost of services by which they are easily diagnosed for availing the health services. The Persons with disabilities and senior citizens from BPL families are availed the services in free of cost.

5. Community Based Rehabilitation (CBR) prog. for the PwDs.

Community Based Rehabilitation (CBR) is a strategy within the community development for rehabilitation equalization of opportunities and social inclusion of all people with disabilities. CBR is implemented through the combined efforts of PwDs, their parents and community members. Knowledge and skill in the field of disability transferred to the target segment of population (PwDs) and their parents for sustainable development in their lively hood.

Organization during the year 2017-18 for the self advocacy of the persons with disabilities, it has been implemented the programme successfully in 61 nos. villages under 06 nos. of Gram Panchayats under Bonth block of Bhadrak district, Odisha. For the sensitizations of the PwDs, parents of PwDs and community members it has been displayed health literacy and legislative frame works and different scope of opportunities to uplift the socio economic status of this distressed segment of population. After door step survey professional as per Individualized Educational Plan (IEP), delivered services to every PwD within the limit of the project area.

The professionals delivered mobile services in the remote rural areas where the services totally constraint or in miniature scale within limit of the project area. In each sub activity the voice of a PwD is honored and also be involved in planning, implementation, monitoring and sustainability of the programme. As per the CBR matrix, activities are initiated systematically i.e. house hold survey, social mobilization, capacity building training programme to the PwDs and parents of PwDs, Local cadres training programme, home based education, counseling, formation Self Help Groups (SHGs), Mobile vocational training and linkages of PwDs with developmental programmes in the operational area.

Each CBR committee consisted with PwDs, Parents of PwDs, P.R.I members, Health worker ASHA, Representative of the local level NGO and Local level trained up cadres. The PwDs are involved in each sub activity of the project. The theme of the social mobilization activities, how the differently abled like normal persons availed equal democratic values in every walk of life.

Women are the vital part of economy both national and households levels. Especially the women with disabilities, considered as the most vulnerable segment of population being the worst suffers



and quite remain spaced in the community. It is the crying need of time how to improve their livelihoods and develop alternatives for increasing their income par with normal women in the community. So, the women with disabilities are provided skill development training, Income generating programme, Self Help Groups (SHGs), education and health services for their inclusion in the community. Organization over the need based situation analysis, organized 06 nos. of differently abled women Self Help Groups (SHGs) and each group consisted with 07 to 10 members in the cluster approach villages within the limit of the project area.

The benefits of S.H.Gs members cited below.

- To bring the purchasing power of the SHG members.
- To get the opportunity to utilize their labor forces and the earnings supplement with the annual income of families.
- Sensitized about their rights in all aspects i.e. education, health and socio economic status like normal persons in the society.

The major thrust for the primary rehabilitation of different categories PwDs organization through camp approach arranged assessment camps (in cluster approach villages) where identified deserved PwDs beneficiaries and distributed/fitment assistive devices to them. It has been also be to correct the deformities of the PwDs. Organization referred 56 (Fifty six) differently abled to NIRTAR, Olatpur, Cuttack and SCB Hospital & Medical College, Cuttack for surgical correction of their deformities.

The differently abled children being considered as the vulnerable segment of population they are delivered proper care, services and also enjoy equal opportunities par with normal children in the community. Our rehabilitation and activity professionals ensured basic rehabilitation services, home based education and counseling to the parents of PwDs and to 193 nos. children with disabilities within the age group of 0 to 15 years in the project area.

The special educators delivered basic rehabilitation services i.e. early identification, primary intervention, secondary intervention, formal and non formal education, adapted physical education, ADL, behavioral modification, natural environment training and prevocational training etc. to the residents of the special school.

The rehabilitation professional, occupational therapist, special educators, vocational instructor, Speech Therapist, Caregivers and Ayahs delivered services and also be created favorable environment and trained up them for leading at least life independently in the community. The rehabilitation professionals as per growth chart and IEP delivered services to the residents regularly.

Presently it has been provided care, special services and friendly environment to 30 (Thirty) nos. of residents of The National Trust disability areas of Samarth Centre. The residents of all age groups provided special education, vocational training, assessment and therapeutic management, behavioral management, yoga and movement of drama therapy etc.

9. Physiotherapy Services for Older Persons:

The concept of retirement from work is leading the aged persons as non productive entity. As when we are aged age our body inevitable goes through many physical changes. These natural age related changes included bone density, reduce muscle strength, increased body fat and poorer co-ordinations and stiffer joints. Older people also become more susceptible to illness such as heart disease, high blood pressure, stroke, diabetes, arthritis and lung diseases such as chronic obstructive pulmonary disease. All of this can have a big impact on their daily lives and reduce their independence. In the context of above lines of situations during the year 2017-18, organization has been delivering physiotherapy services supporting with the Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Govt. of India at Dahanigadia, Charampa under Bhadrak district of the state Odisha.

Organization deployed experienced physiotherapist for delivering services to the distressed senior citizens. The physiotherapy centre equipped with Laser therapy, Short wave Diathermy (SWD), Interferential therapy, Muscle stimulator, Ultrasound Therapy, Computerized cervical thoracic and lumbar traction, Therapeutic bed, Hydroculator, Shoulder exerciser, Wrist exerciser, multi exerciser

Presently there are 30 nos. of CwSNs of The National Trust disability areas are delivered services in the centre. The details category wise residents covered of services cited below.

11. Low Vision Centre:

Low vision is a serious health problem which has been urgently needed to deliver comprehensive preventive measures to combat the existing rising trend of this segment of population in the community. As per our experience it is felt that unlike total blind most of individuals with low vision have some useful sight but as vision deteriorated those affects often find it difficult to accomplish the task of everyday life. In the context of the plight of above lines organization has been continuing the low vision centre since 1st April 2003 in Bhadrak district of the state, Odisha.

The main objectives of the low vision centre to provide care, treatment, communicate information and counseling about health literacy. It has been also be delivered services i.e. identification, assessment prescribed appropriate optical aids and mobility training which will improve the visual efficiencies and social activities par with normal persons in the community.

There are people affected with cataract and trachoma provided the opportunities of surgery in free of cost. After proper diagnosis ophthalmologist prescribed magnifying glasses for improving the visual efficiency of the persons with low vision. Besides medico rehabilitative services the ophthalmologist imparted health literacy and advice special services to improve their visual efficiency in gradual process of time.

During the year 2017-18, there are 2706 nos. of persons with low vision delivered services from Bhadrak, Balasore, Jajpur and Keonjhar districts of the state of Odisha. It has been also be provided orientation of mobility training to the children below 15 (fifteen) years for improving their visual efficiency to the optimum point of possible.

12. District Level Observance of Senior Citizens week:

CRSR is a pioneer organization working in the field of providing rehabilitation services to the PwDs in the State, arranged a health check-up camp and sensitization prog. for the senior citizens on 13/10/2017 in its premises on the occasion of district level senior citizens week. The prog. was inaugurated by the Collector & Dist. Magistrate, Bhadrak, Sj. Gyana Das and other guests of honours, Sj. Shyambhakta Mishra, A.D.M; Sj. Govinda Ch. Mallick, A.S.P; Sj. Narottam Behera, Sub collector; Sj. Pradyumn Ku. Ray, DSSO; Sj. Golekha Ch. Behera, P.R.O; Smt. Ashalata Mohanty, DSWO; Dr. Bhagaban Parida, chief functionary of CRSR and Sivaram Dhal, Ex-DSSO, Bhadrak,



participated in the programme. Dr. Debaraj Panigrahi, Dr. Namita Pani, Dr. Amarendra Mohanty, Prosthetic & Orthotic engineer Pragyana Aparajita Mohanty, Audiologist cum speech therapist Kamalakanta Barik, ECG technician Sri Ajaya Ku. Bhattacharya and Pathology technician Kanakalata Sahu check up the health status of the invited senior citizens and distributed free medicines, walking sticks, Knee caps, Hearing aids etc. to them. For reducing the effect of deformities some senior citizens are also be advised to continue physiotherapy services in free of cost. Prosthetic & Orthotic engineer & technicians took measurement of 16 (Sixteen) nos. of senior citizens and fabricated assistive devices.

There are 280 nos. of senior citizens participated in the occasion. As per the opinion of the guests especially the aged have usually carried high status in the society. But regret their experiential wisdom is not considered productive in this age of mass technological production. More over the concept of retirement from work is lowering of their status as non-productive entity.

13. Observance of World Mental Health Day:

To success the thematic value of the replaced mental health Act 1987, organization in collaboration with District Legal aid Services Authority (DLSA), Bhadrak celebrated the World Mental Health Day on 10.10.2017 at the conference hall of the Organization, Charampa, Bhadrak. Parida, chief functionary of CRSR, Bhadrak, delivered his experience while working in the field of disability over a long span of time in Bhadrak district and also explained about the role of parents of person with mental illness and community members how to rehabilitate their Children with Mental Illness adapting with family environment.

There are around 150 (One hundred fifty) nos. of persons and special children with Mental illness, Mental Retardation and community members participated in the programme. The invited guests distributed wheel chair, smart cane and walkers to the PwDs in the prog.

14. Therapeutic and rehabilitative Services for persons with Intellectual Disabilities

Centre for rehabilitation Services & Research (CRSR), Bhadrak, with the financial assistance of Dept. of Social Security & Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (SSEPD), Govt. of Odisha, successfully continuing the Institutional based therapeutic and rehabilitation services for the persons with intellectual disabilities from 1st April 2016 at the working office of the organization; Dahanigadia; Charampa; Bhadrak, state of Odisha.

The fulfill the objective of the programme is to improve their skill deficits; improving competencies and facilitating optimal functioning in order to provide the maximum possible measures of Social economic participation, self reliance of independent living, Organization providing group home facilities for all age groups of Persons with Cerebral Palsy and Intellectual Disabled children with adequate and quality care services with acceptable living standard. A range of service provided in the centre are: Residential Care (Respite home), Vocational & Pre-vocational Training, Physiotherapy & Occupational services, Speech Therapy, Medical services through Clinical Psychologist, Psychiatrist, behavioural specialist, speech therapist and Physicians, informal education and training in the form of pre-school, intervention, Personal care, daily living skills and adaptive skills, Social interaction, skill development, behaviour modification training Referral Services & Networking.



The Physiotherapist, Occupational Therapist, Psychologist are provided therapeutical management & Psycho therapy to the Intellectual Disability children.

The concern rehabilitation professionals as per their diagnosis delivered manual & mechanical services individually to the PwDs. During the year 2017-18, there are 40 nos. of intellectual disabilities delivered services in the centre.

15. World Autism Awareness Day

CRSR, as a State level Social organization commemorated the observance of world autism awareness day with the corporate action of district administration (Social security dept.) and Sarba Sikhya Aviyan (S.S.A), Bhadrak on 02.04.2017 at Sanskruti Bhawan of Bhadrak district. The programme has been conducted under the chairmanship of Sj. Sambunath Panigrahi, B.E.O of Bhadrak block, Bhadrak. The guests of honour as Sivaram Dhal, DSSO, Bhadrak, Sj. Jaladhar Mandal, IED Co-coordinator, SSA, Bhadrak, Mr. Bhagaban Parida, chief functionary of CRSR, Bhadrak, Sanatan Sahu, BRCC and Gadadhar Nayak, BRT participated in the programme.

While addressing in the programme Sj. Dhal emphasized on the rights of the persons with Autism disabilities and their participation in Social, Cultural and financial aspects of life like normal persons in the community. The

Sj. Mandal gave his opinion that the autism segment of population as a part of community and they are also be given the scope of

opportunities like the differently abled persons in the community. Dr. Parida discussed with details over the congenital and environmental reasons and the ratio of autism population rising at a fast rate and still reasons are under the fold of research.

There are 150 nos of teachers, students, social workers, CRCC from different blocks and the guardians of PwDs participated in the programme.

16. Club foot surgical operation.

Centre for Rehabilitation Services & Research (CRSR), Bhadrak, in cooperation with district administration (Social Security Dept.), Sarba Sikhya Aviyan (SSA) and Rastriya Bal Swasthya Karyakram (RBSK) successfully completed the Club foot surgical operation camp at Dist. Headquarter Hospital. It was done in two phases where 46 nos. of children with CTEV and club foot were operated on. 30.08.2017 and 21.03.2018 respectively. The programme was financially supported by the Dept. of Social Security & Empowerment of persons with disabilities, Govt. of Odisha.

After screening camp, 46 nos. of children were selected for surgery. The camps was inaugurated by collector & Dist. magistrate, Bhadrak, Sj. Gyana Das and director of "NIRTAR", Olatpur, Cuttack. Dr. Shakti Prasad Das. The doctors of NIRTAR, Cuttack, Dr. Kishore Mohapatra, Dr. Jagannath Sahoo and Dr. Pabitra Sahoo and Dr. U.K.Jena of Bhadrak medical operated 46 (Forty six) nos. children



those are born with club foot, CTEV, Infant tile Hemi paresis with equines foot and TA tightening etc.. Out of 46(Forty six) nos. of children there are 29 nos. of boys and 17 nos. of girls. After one month observation and removal of plaster, children are delivered residential physiotherapy services by the centre for 15 days and fitted with Orthosis (Calipers, CTEV shoe/Surgical shoes) for relief of stiffness and prevent of further contracture.

17. Care & Protection of Spastic Children:

Centre for Rehabilitation Services & Research (CRSR), Bhadrak, with the financial assistance of Dept. of Social Security & Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (SSEPD), Govt. of Odisha has started a Day boarding centre for Cerebral Palsy & Intellectual Disability children at Dhamnagar block of Bhadrak district, Odisha.

The main objective of the scheme is to identify the psychological and therapy needs of the beneficiary, assess the capacity of each beneficiary to place them in groupings and grades, to make maximum level of functional ADL activities, behavioral problems and to impart special skills, self-help skills, and cater to the therapy needs of the beneficiary, educational and vocational needs, give special inputs for the improvement of the communication skills of the beneficiary as well as the parents.



CRSR has work experience of more than 20 years in providing institutional services like multi modal therapy, early identification and intervention and has good network of professionals working in the field of disability. During the year 2017-18, there are 50 nos. of children with Cerebral Palsy & Intellectual Disability children delivered services under this prog.

18. Fitment of Smart Appliances:

Centre for Rehabilitation Services & Research (CRSR), Bhadrak with the financial assistance of Dept. of Social Security & Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (SSEPD), Govt. of Odisha has fabricated and fitted Bilateral smart (High-tech) Prosthesis to Mr. Narayan Ch. Sahoo, a PwD of Bhadrak block



who have lost his both legs

by a train accident during the year 2013.. This was a research project for the organization and after six months of research we got this success for fitment of this high tech prosthesis and he is capable for self-reliant and smile.

19. Fitment of Prosthetic & Orthotic Aids/Appliances to the PwDs under BBSA:

Govt. of Odisha, Department of Social Security & Empowerment of PwDs authorised CRSR as the fabricating & fitment agency under BBSA programme for the districts of Bhadrak, Balasore, Jajpur, Keonjhar and Mayurbhanj and accordingly professionals of the organization attended the BBSA camp of each district and assessed the PwDs for supply/fitment of aids/appliances as per the degree of Disability. Pre-fabricated aids/appliances are procure from ALIMOC by the concerned district and fabricated aids/appliances such as prosthetic & orthotic appliances are fitted by the Organization under BBSA guidelines. During the current year Organization fitted 624 nos. prosthetic & Orthotic aids/appliances in above five districts.



20. Operation Muskan Campaign:

The campaign of Operation Muskan started on 15.07.2017 to 30.07.2017 with the corporate action of Dist Police administration, Child welfare committee (CWC), Dist. Child protection Deptt, Society for weaker community and CRSR, Bhadrak of Odisha state.

The objectives of the campaign is to stop child labour and rescue the under aged children those are working at Hotels, Restaurants, Garages, Shops and small enterprises at very low wages. The campaign started with assistance of Dist. Police assistance where 182 nos. of below 14 years children are rescued and sheltered at CRSR, Charampa, Bhadrak for the time being.

At last to sensitize the parents of under aged children there has been arranged a sensitization meeting with the participation of IIC of Bhadrak town Police station, District Child Protection officer (DCPO), Chairman, Child welfare committee (CWC), Chief functionary of CRSR,, Weaker community Bhadrak, Odisha. In the meeting it has been discussed about the basic laws and rights of children for their rehabilitation in future. At last all the minor aged children are handed over to their parents.

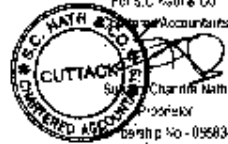

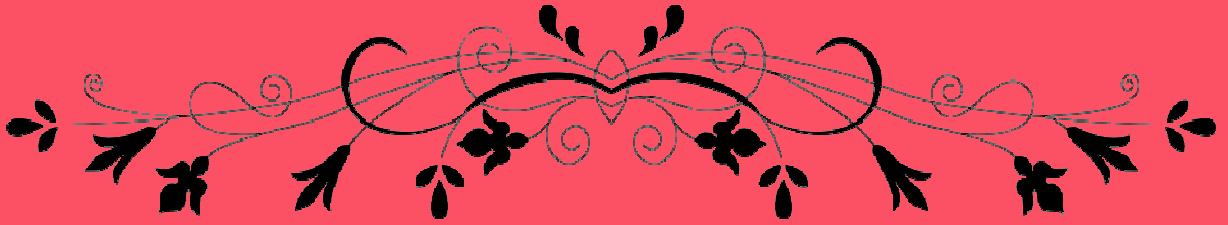
